RESOLUTION

Whereas George Judson Cain was called home to be with his Lord on March 31, 1990; and

Whereas "Jud", as he was affectionately known, was an active and energetic member of the First Presbyterian Church and of this Session for many years; and

Whereas it is the desire of this Session that a record be made of the love, affection and respect that they had for him;

Therefore be it resolved as follows:

George Judson Cain was born August 22, 1891 in Learned, Mississippi. He attended the church and the school in that area until going to Chamberlain-Hunt Academy in Port Gibson, Mississippi. He was a covenant child and while attending the Lebanon Church in Learned, Mississippi he made his personal profession of faith and accepted Christ as his Saviour. He was elected an elder in the First Presbyterian Church of Raymond, Mississippi in July of 1924 and served as an Elder in that Church until he moved his Church letter to the First Presbyterian Church of Jackson, Mississippi. He was elected an elder by that congregation on February 14, 1943. He served as General Superintendent of the Sunday School of the First Presbyterian Church for 11 years and served continuously as an Elder in the First Presbyterian Church from the date of his election in 1943 until his death.

George Judson Cain graduated from the University of Mississippi and from Peabody College, where he received his Masters Degree. He served as a public school teacher, starting with a one room school and progressing to the Agricultural High School at Raymond, Mississippi. He was elected as president of Hinds Junior College in 1928 and remained as its president until 1938 when he resigned to become the Director of Administration Finance for the State Department of Education for the State of Mississippi.

He received many honors and awards for his work in education including serving as President of the Southern States Association of School Finance Directors.

George Judson Cain was interested in the civic welfare of the community where he lived and thus he was active in the Kivans Club, the Mississippi Education Association, the National Education Association, and served as a Board Member of the Salvation Army.

George Judson Cain was a family man and devoted to his family. He was married to Nina Oshorn of Lebanon, Mississippi and one son, George J. Cain, Jr., was born to that marriage. After the death of Nina he married Louise Harris of Jackson. He is survived by his widow, his son, two grand children and five great grandchildren.

"Jud" will be remembered by the members of this Session as a man of competence, integrity and enthusiasm but even more as a man who loved his Lord, who was devoted to his family and who assumed his responsibilities as an officer of this Church in a willing and thoughtful manner. He served as a "role model" for many of the members of this Session who had the opportunity to know and to love him and it is with great pleasure that this Session records this Resolution on its records to be preserved for posterity.

Be it further resolved that a copy of this Resolution be furnished to members of the family of George Judson Cain and made part of the permanent records of this Session.
