





**RESOLUTION IN MEMORIAM
OF
GEORGE L. LEMON**

George Lemasson Lemon was called Home on April 11, 2006 at the age of 98 following a full, abundant and rewarding life, and the Session marks his Homegoing with the following Resolution:

WHEREAS, George Lemasson Lemon, the son of James Kirkpatrick Lemon, Sr. and Georgia Sara MacIntosh, was born in Gulfport, Mississippi, was schooled in Ocean Springs and was graduated from Mississippi State University with a degree in civil engineering; and

WHEREAS, in 1936 George and Anna Mae Brewster were married and of that union, Ann, Sara and Georgia were born; and

WHEREAS, George proudly served his country as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Army Corps of Engineers and the Army Air Corps, continuing this service in the Air Force Reserve and retiring in 1967 with the rank of Lt. Colonel; and
